A Cause for Giving Thanks

Thomas Jefferson's reminder that "the price of freedom is eternal vigilance" seems to be paying off.

According to a recent report in the New York Times ("For a Trusty Voting Bloc, a Faith Shaken," Oct. 7, 2007), "religious conservative leaders say they are having passionate debates in private over whether to choose a candidate based on viability or purity. Old allies find themselves fractured among the camps of Fred Thompson, Mitt Romney, John McCain, Duncan Hunter, Ron Paul and Mr. [Mike] Huckabee." It seems that Republican voters are not, as the religious right claims, uniformly persuaded that ideological purity should be the litmus test of a Republican candidate. The idea of settling for some of what you want when you can't get everything you want constitutes a large part of what makes an informed democracy work. The mere fact that the religious right is even considering such a pragmatic idea is a positive sign.

Nevertheless, one swallow doesn't mean it's spring. The reason freedom requires eternal vigilance is that those who would abridge freedom never sleep – especially when they believe they're doing the will of G-d.

A case in point is Senator John McCain's recent statement that "the Constitution established the United States of America as a Christian nation." Were America to become a Christian nation, the religious freedom of Jews, Muslims, Buddhists, Hindus, agnostics, and atheists would become dependent on the integrity of people

like McCain. It would be considered a gift to be granted rather than an inalienable human right. A man who first refers to Jerry Falwell and Pat Robertson as "agents of intolerance," but who then accepts an honorary degree from Falwell's Liberty University, is capable – when desperate for votes – of declaring America a Christian nation. I'd hate to have my religious freedom depend on his good will.

Of more immediate concern, however, is the fact that McCain's claim is not only objectionable; it is downright false. Not only does the Constitution not "establish the United States of America as a Christian nation"; it does exactly the opposite. The First Amendment reads: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof." It is this clause that Thomas Jefferson called "a wall of separation between church and state." The rights of minority religions should not be dependent on the good will of any person or group, but rather on the Constitution's universal "wall of separation."

The issue at stake is whether America will remain a pluralistic democracy or become a society where (in George Orwell's words) all people are equal but some are more equal than others. As long as America refuses to go down the road to theocracy, it will remain a place of hope and good will for people of all faiths and for those of no faith. To the extent that it has thus far managed to do so, we have cause to give thanks.

Happy Thanksgiving. (And don't forget to *bensch!*)

Why we need an elevator

In last month's column, I described how the heavy storms that tore through Cleveland on August 7th severely damaged our synagogue. Falling branches ripped 18 holes in the flat roof above our sanctuary reading table. Water damaged our ceiling, walls, and carpeting. A light fixture fell. The elevator shaft flooded and water damaged our elevator.

Our dedicated members quickly responded to limit the damage and clean up the mess. They coordinated repairs to our building with days to spare before we welcomed everyone to worship on Rosh Hashanah. As I write this shortly after Simhat Torah, we do not know when we will be able to repair our elevator. We are certain to incur tens of thousands of dollars of out-of-pocket expenses to cover our insurance deductible, non-covered repairs, and improvements to prevent future problems. We need to get our elevator running again to fulfill our dream.

Our dream began in 1998 when the members of Temple Beth El and Heights Synagogue began worshipping together at the Mayfield JCC. It would have been easier for us to disband and join other congregations, but it would not have been as satisfying. We wanted to honor our traditions and, frankly, we have an independent streak.

We decided that people should not have to pay to pray: members' financial situations do not limit their participation in our congregation. In February 2000, we became Beth El – The Heights Synagogue. We learned together during our early days - and we've been learning ever since.

From the beginning, we planned to acquire a home of our own. Our Facilities Team evaluated many properties. Our congregation voted to acquire our synagogue in March 2003. We received the keys in July and our learning curve became steeper and bumpier.

A Lutheran congregation built the original Gothic structure in the 1920s. A Jewish congregation acquired it in the late 1940s. They enlarged the sanctuary to create the area behind our reading table and built a Greek Revival main entrance. The stairs pitched steeply to stay within the property line. They were dangerously deteriorated when we acquired the building.

Our Board had to decide between repairing the vertiginous stairs and building a new, accessible main entrance. We quickly decided the latter. We worked with our architect to design our main entrance with lobby doors on grade and an elevator to our sanctuary and social hall. Generous donations by our members and friends, including a major grant from the Schnurmann Foundation in memory of Helen and Julius Weil, enabled us to celebrate the Grand Opening of our accessible main entrance in June 2005. Members who needed the elevator had tears of appreciation in their eyes, as did the rest of us.

We meet the challenges of building our community with the strength of our relationships and our belief in our future together. We take collective and personal responsibility for each other. We finance our common needs. These axiomatic principles of Jewish community are founding principles of **Beth El – The Heights Synagogue.**

We need to get our elevator running so we can once again welcome all for worship, learning, and community. Our donations affirm our meaningful relationships, our shared values, and our connected stories. Please do your part with your check to our Rainy Day Fund.
