The Incredible Shrinking **Human Being?**

As the month of Elul comes, and we begin our spiritual preparations for the High Holy Days, it can be instructive to look at Psalm 90, familiar to us as part of the Shabbat morning service.

In this psalm, entitled "A Prayer of Moses, the Man of God," we hear the greatest of the prophets expressing humankind's awareness of its own fragility and mortality. "You turn man back into dust, saying, 'Return, O mortals!'" (Psalms 90:3).

Our Sages, of blessed memory, also heard another message in these words, lingering there like an overtone: "You give human beings leave to shrink as small as dust, calling to them, 'Come back, O mortals!" (Talmud, P'sahim 54a).

Our very humanness makes us prone not only to physical but also to moral and ethical degeneration. Awareness of our condition puts us in danger of despair of thinking that we are unregenerate. As Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur approach, we may find ourselves saying, "Who am I kidding? I'll confess, I'll repent, and then I'll just go out and do the same thing again. It's all a charade."

That is when we need to listen to the

midrashic overtone in Moses' words: No matter how small you've shrunk, you can grow back to your full size: "Come back, O mortals!" The Hebrew for "come back" is "shuvu," from the same root as the word "t'shuvah," which means repentance, returning.

In the story of the spies sent by Moses to scout out the land, they return to camp and lament, "All the people that we saw in it are men of great size. We saw the titans there – veritable giants of the titan race – and we looked like grasshoppers to ourselves, and so we looked to them" (Numbers 13:33). They seem to be saying, "Because we looked so small to ourselves, they looked so big to us."

As the psalm that speaks in Moses' voice assures us, we can never shrink so small that God will stop calling us back. The struggle against our own pettiness, indifference, or despair can make those internal foes appear much bigger than they are, and thus make us appear much smaller than we are. But our Creator doesn't see us that way.

As we ready ourselves for a new year, we can resolve to stop getting small and to grow to our full moral and ethical (continued on page 6)

Preparation for the High Holy Days

A book written by Alan Lew called "This is Real..." begins, "You are walking through the world half-asleep." You never question who you are or how or why you got here. "Suddenly conscious of your estrangement," you hear a great horn sound, "calling you to remembrance, but all you can remember is how much you have forgotten."

In this way, Rabbi Alan Lew begins his book about the long sequence of the Days of Awe. When we listen to the shofar "blasts" in the sanctuary, do we think about what a nice job the "blower" did, or how proud we are that David, or our grandson, or Shmuel has learned to do this? Or do we think of the message of these shofar calls?

Do I examine my life in terms of good vs. evil, or "I'm sorry for what I have done." Or do I ask some big questions:

- 1. What do I value? not the short answer version.
- 2. What is my life about?
- 3. Whose lives can I make better by what I do this coming year?
- 4. What experiences, what commitments, really matter to me? Go ahead, Self, take a couple of weeks to think about this. *Shanah Tovah*


